ARNEC is pleased to host its webinar amplifying the important linkage of early childhood development (ECD) and climate change with a specific focus on how global warming exacerbates many of the factors that increase flood risk. This webinar will discuss why this risk is particularly high in the Asia-Pacific region as some of the countries share their experiences and insights.

1. Discussion focus and speakers

Over 400 million children in the Asia-Pacific region are at extreme risk from flooding, and 70% of people exposed to flooding globally are in South and East Asia. As flooding risks escalate due to climate change, land subsidence, and coastal development, it is critical to address the impact of floods on early childhood development. She is a development professional with over two decades of experience in various local and international NGOs, including UN Women and Conservation International. She has proven competency in a range of roles including marketing and communications, program management, partnership development and fundraising. Her portfolio of past and present projects includes air pollution, lead poisoning, non-communicable diseases and data and indicators for environmental and climate health tracking. She holds a Bachelor of Communications from Northwestern University and a Master of Tri-Sector Collaboration from the Singapore Management University. She is currently based in Singapore.

Baela served as Technical Advisor to the federal Ministry of Education (2001-2004/5). She has actively promoted ECCE, girls' education, gender rights and public private partnerships. She leads the citizenled assessment and accountability initiative, ASER Pakistan. Baela has led whole school improvement as a niche area since 2000, ECCE and the second chance program for adolescent girls in Pakistan, Siyani Sahelian (wise friends), recognized as a HundrEd innovation in 2022-23. From 2015 to 2023, she served as a Commissioner to the Education Commission. Baela is associated with global, regional, national and provincial Boards, Baela has worked in USA, UK, HongKong, South Asia and Pakistan.
