Message

The year 2023 was very meaningful for ARNEC. It was a period of **renewal**, **reconnecting**, and **rediscovering**, in many ways.

This year saw ARNEC's renewed commitment to our advocacy priorities including responsive caregiving, working with national networks and partners in advancing multi-sectoral approaches to ECD, addressing the impacts of climate change on young children, and promoting the capacity and wellbeing of the ECD workforce.

It was also an opportunity to reconnect at a deeper level with partners and stakeholders. ARNEC takes pride in being a platform for sharing and learning across countries not only on different ECD issues and challenges, but also good ECD practices and innovative strategies.

Through webinars, convening, training priorities, and forums, ARNEC was able to bring together ECD policy-makers, advocates, champions, and practitioners from different countries to facilitate knowledge-exchange and learning.

The Learning Forum hosted by the ECCD Council of the Philippines in Cebu in August 2023 brought together 17 countries sharing their ECD achievements and challenges, providing opportunities to connect with their peers, and strengthening their commitment to advance inclusive and holistic ECD in the region.

ARNEC also rediscovered better opportunities for collaboration with the countries and how this could facilitate ARNEC's network impact. Through the engagement of country-level partners including national ECD networks, we were able to demonstrate the power of working together, especially in research, advocacy, and capacity-building.

The year 2023 also saw ARNEC's strength in generating knowledge and evidence to support advocacy. The launch of ARNEC Connections on playful parenting, production of micro-research studies on ECD and climate change, development of fact sheets on specific climate risks relevant to the region, publication of SEL Handbook for ECCE teachers, and documentation of good ECD practices and innovations in

pandemic context were among those we co-developed with partners to support the ECD agenda in the region.

As ARNEC welcomes 2024 and the remaining years in our Network Strategy, we continue to put young children at the center of our learning, advocacy, and agenda.

We commit to strengthen our relationships with partners and explore new ones to widen the support for ECD in the region, especially to address; if not reverse, the impacts of multiple crises facing young children in the region, as much as in other parts of the world.

We invite you to read the 2023 Annual Report, celebrate the gains of the network of partners for young children in the region, and move you to support advocacy priorities and ECD agenda in the Asia-Pacific region.

Advancing the ECD agenda in the Asia-Pacific region meant rekindling relationships with partners and making new ones in the network post-pandemic.

Beyond virtual means of keeping connections, such as holding webinars, ARNEC held its first face-to-face convening post-pandemic in the Philippines with the theme Connecting and collaborating for holistic ECD agenda in the Asia-Pacific region in August 2023.

ARNEC's advocacy priorities provided opportunities to work with partners at the country-level demonstrating our network advantage to connect through evidence-based ECD agendas responsive to country contexts and needs.

ARNEC's emerging network impact is demonstrated by partners, such as the HI ECD Coalition in Indonesia and the Philippine Normal University, who contextualised ECD agendas in these countries informed by ARNEC's advocacy priorities.


the advocacy support the Save the Children Bhutan's Prescription to Play (P2P) project




Unleashing the power of playful parenting in support of early childhood development outcomes

The 2023 ARNEC Connections have showcased a range of different approaches taken in the region to introduce playful parenting or play-based interactions in ECD programs in the context of COVID-19. Authors shared their experiences in adapting their programs to the diverse contexts at the country level during the pandemic, including the formative and mature evidence from program development, adjustment, and implementation.

Asia-wide Convening to Support Parents and Caregivers



In the last quarter of 2022, ARNEC was sought to lead the Asia Convening of the Global Initiative to Support Parents (GISP) on behalf of WHO, UNICEF, ECDAN, End Violence Against Children, and Parenting for Lifelong Health.

ARNEC facilitated the selection of evidencebased parenting programs from the region to showcase in the GISP learning forum.

On strengthening the capacity of national **ECD** networks and supporting multisectoral approaches to ECD

capacity-building for eight national ECD networks in the region

ARNEC invested in improving capacities of national ECD networks after doing a baseline survey in 2021-2022. A network of national ECD networks is a primary cohort of ARNEC to influence the scope and direction of network impact at the country level. The target partners were:

In South Asia:

- Bangladesh ECD Network;
- · Bhutan ECD Network;
- Alliance for Early Childhood Development Nepal (AECDN); and
- · Pakistan Alliance for Early Childhood;

In Southeast Asia:

- Network on Early Childhood Care and Development in Cambodia;
- Holistic-Integrated ECD Coalition in Indonesia; and
- ECCD Council of the Philippines

In East Asia:

Mongolia National ECD Network.

the regional guidance document on building and strengthening national ECD networks

ARNEC formulated a set of principles and guidance notes for national ECD networks responsive to country context and informed by the assessment of network health in each jurisdiction.

The guidance document has remained one of ARNEC's key references in assessing areas of development and opportunities for improvement in country-level ECD networks to progress the ECD agenda with national and local partners.

national ECD networks with emerging network impact at the country level, particularly in Bhutan, Indonesia, and Nepal fostering improved multisectoral coordination for ECD

- In Bhutan the ECCD network has fostered and mobilised partnerships across 20 districts to co-develop the country's first multisectoral strategic plan for ECCD.
- Meanwhile, AECDN went local by establishing ECD management committees to provide technical support to develop integrated local ECD plans and programs.
- HI ECD Coalition worked with partners in Indonesia to influence government to consider the inter-linkages of climate change, environmental degradation, and ECD and is now actively engage





Dr. Sheldon Shaeffer, Chair of the ARNEC Board of Directors, addressed policy-makers, senior government officials, and partners in the Southeast Asia Policy Dialogue on ECCE held in Jakarta with the support of the Government of Indonesia, ARNEC, and the Association of Southeast Nations (ASEAN), among other partners.


- the Pacific Forum in Fiji;
- Southeast Asia Policy Dialogue on ECCE in Jakarta, Indonesia, on July 26, 2023, focusing on Resilience Building in ECCE: A Fundamental Tool to Reach SDG4 and Beyond: and
- APCCA Brown Bag Session on September 27, 2023, discussing resilience building in ECD.

ARNEC participated in COP28 in Dubai, co-hosting side events to highlight nurturing care in ECD as a cost-effective investment for climate resilience and sustainable development in the climate-vulnerable Asia-Pacific region.




The Bhutan study gauged the awareness levels of children, parents, and early childhood educators in Bhutan regarding climate change and its effects on young children.


The India study examined the impacts of household air pollution on young children and women's health. The study also raised effective policy interventions and awareness campaigns for promoting clean cooking practices.

A call to action: Air pollution in early childhood

The evidence is clear: Air pollution is harmful in early childhood, and can also lead to lifelong health and developmental impacts. In this brief, we provide more information about this issue and suggest a list of actions that we can take, whether as individuals or collectively. Air pollution is deadly, estimated to kill an average of 7 million people every year. And even when it doesn't kill, it affects every organ in the body and increases the risk of many diseases, including stroke, heart disease, diabetes, cancer and depression. Even at low levels invisible to the naked eye, air pollution can cause measurable differences in the health of populations. Air pollution affects not just young children's health: The ripple effects prevent them from realizing their full potential in life.






Figure 2: Components of the nurturing care framework Source: https://nurturing-care.org A clean, healthy, and sustainable environment¹ underpins the Nurturing Care Framework, influencing health and development of young children.

Young children in the Asia-Pacific bear the highest burden of air pollution


Advancing the ECD and climate change agenda requires a collective effort to raise awareness about the importance of protecting the rights of young children.

It is essential to amplify their voices regarding the impacts of climate change on their health, well-being, and development, and to position ECD at the forefront of the fight against climate change and in achieving sustainable development goals.

To support this initiative, ARNEC developed the ECD-Climate Resource Kit in collaboration with Vital Strategies. The first fact sheet focused on air pollution, which poses significant risks during early childhood and can lead to lasting health and developmental issues.

In partnership with Vital Strategies, ARNEC created the Air Pollution Factsheet to provide detailed information on this critical topic and to propose a range of actions that individuals and communities can take to address it.



Scan the QR code to access UNESCO's Teacher Training Handbook for Social and Emotional Learning, which was prepared with technical inputs from ARNEC.

ARNEC moved to do training for early childhood teachers on building Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) competencies, following the finalisation of UNESCO Bangkok's Asia-Pacific Early Childhood Care and Education Teacher Training Handbook for SEL.

ARNEC in partnership with UNESCO Bangkok and AECES, hosted a 4-day regional training for trainers on SEL in Singapore in November 2023.

The overall objective was to build the capacity of the selected countries to expand inclusive quality ECCE and enhance teachers' ability to effectively deliver SEL to young learners.

A total of 21 participants from 7 countries, representing various organisations and government bodies, took part in the training.

ARNEC convened its Learning Groups on Responsive Caregiving and Playful Parenting and Multisectoral Approaches to ECD. Institutional Members, and National Representatives (NatReps) to take stock of ECD gains and challenges postpandemic and what the ECD community in the Asia-Pacific region could learn from each other from noteworthy practices through country-level contextualisation and adaptation.

This was the first face-to-face learning forum convened by ARNEC after the pandemic

focusing on the theme Connecting and collaborating for holistic ECD in the Asia-Pacific region.

With 70 delegates from 17 countries in the region, the Learning Forum used diverse learning methodologies encompassing site visits, paper presentations, small group discussions and workshops, plenary sessions, and cultural appreciation.







